Epistle Reading: 1 Corinthians 3:9-17

For we are God's fellow workers; you are God's field, you are God's building. According to the grace of God which was given to me, as a wise master builder I have laid the foundation, and another builds on it. But let each one take heed how he builds on it. For no other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ. Now if anyone builds on this foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw, each one's work will become clear; for the Day will declare it, because it will be revealed by fire; and the fire will test each one's work, of what sort it is. INFORMATION FROM THE 19TH ALL-AMERICAN COUNCIL, ST LOUIS, MO

This past week the Orthodox Church in America (OCA) held its 19th All-American Council (AAC) in St. Louis, MO. Father Mark represented our parish as a delegate during the plenary sessions. He will provide the parish with a report in the near future on what occurred during week and what the OCA has planned for its future from the sessions, forums, and discussions held at the AAC.

Below is a summary of action taken on recommendations submitted to the Resolution Committee in accordance with the OCA Statues:

- Statue revision resolutions to change the periodicity for audits by the Audit Committee of all OCA accounts [from semi-annual to annual],
- clarifying the election of at-large members of the Metropolitan Council [must be a delegate in attendance at the AAC],
- the right to canonical process [change wording from “can defend themselves” to may defend themselves”], and
- the composition of the Synodal Court [to now include Auxiliary Bishops of OCA].

The four resolutions above along with resolutions to correct typo-errors in the Statues all Passed!!

In addition to the above, two major decisions were taken during the same plenary session. The first was a proposed amendment to the Statue of the OCA calling for the periodicity of the All-American Council to be changed from every three years to every four years. Even with 210 delegates voting in favor of the change and 203 delegates voting against it, the necessary two-thirds majority was not obtained to pass the amendment. The next AAC will occur three years from now in 2021.

The second was a proposed resolution, which detailed how each territorial diocese, with the exception of Canada, Mexico and Alaska, are to remit their annual financial obligations for the work of the Chancery for 2019 through 2021. After much considerable discussion, the resolution Carried! What this means for our Diocese is their annual financial obligation to the OCA will be reduced by 2% each year over the next three years not to fall below 34% of the Diocese’s “net operating revenue” (currently, in 2018, the Diocese remits 46% of its “net operating revenue” to the OCA and that percentage will be reduced down 2% each year over the next three years to 40% of the Diocese “net operating revenue” by 2021).

Martyr Callinicus of Gangra In Asia Minor [July 29th]

The Holy Martyr Callinicus, a native of Cilicia, was raised from childhood in the Christian Faith. Grieving that many misguided people would perish for eternity because they worshiped idols, he went through the cities and villages to proclaim Jesus Christ and His teachings to the pagans, and with the Word of God he converted many to Christianity.

In the Galatian city of Ancyra the holy confessor was arrested and brought to trial before a governor named Sacerdonus, a fierce persecutor of Christians. The governor, threatening tortures and death, ordered the saint to offer sacrifice to the idols. The saint fearlessly declared that he was not afraid of martyrdom, since every believer in Christ receives from Him strength in ordeals, and through death inherits an eternal blessed life.

They cruelly beat the saint with ox thongs and tore at his body with iron hooks, but he endured everything with patience and calm. This aroused still greater fury in Sacerdonus, and he ordered that sandals with sharp nails be placed on the saint's feet, and that they should drive the martyr with whips to the city of Gangra to be burned.

The pathway was arduous, and the soldiers who accompanied the condemned man were weak from thirst. In despair they began to implore the saint to pray the Lord for water. The saint, taking pity on his tormentors, with the help of God caused a miraculous spring of water to gush forth from a stone. The astonished soldiers were filled with sympathy for their rescuer, and they wanted even to set him free. Fear of execution, however, compelled them to bring the martyr farther. In Gangra, Saint Callinicus joyfully offered thanks to the Lord, Who had vouchsafed him the crown of martyrdom. He went into the blazing fire and gave up his soul to God. His body, remaining unharmed, was reverently buried by believers.
