Texts for the Liturgical Service

Troparion (Tone 1)

When the <u>stone</u> had been sealed by the <u>Jews</u>, / while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure <u>bo</u>dy, / Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, / granting <u>life</u> to the world. / The <u>pow</u>ers of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giver of Life</u>: / "Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ! / <u>Glory</u> to Thy <u>King</u>dom! // Glory to Thy dispensation, O thou who <u>lov</u>est of mankind!"

Troparion (Tone 8 – Saint Mary of Egypt)

The image of <u>God</u> was <u>truly</u> preserved in thee, O <u>Mother</u>, / for thou didst take <u>up</u> the <u>Cross</u> and <u>followed</u> Christ. / By so <u>doing</u>, thou <u>taught</u>est us to disregard the flesh for it <u>pass</u>eth away; / but to care in<u>stead</u> for the <u>soul</u>, for it is im<u>mortal</u>. // Therefore thy <u>spirit</u>, O <u>holy</u> Mother Mary, rejoiceth with the <u>ang</u>els.

Kontakion (Tone 1)

As <u>God</u>, Thou didst rise from the tomb in glory, / raising the <u>world</u> with Thyself. / Human <u>na</u>ture praises Thee as God, for death has <u>van</u>ished. / Adam exults, O <u>Mas</u>ter! / Eve rejoices, for she is freed from bondage and <u>cries</u> to Thee: //"Thou art the Giver of Resurrection to <u>all</u>, O Christ!"

Kontakion (Tone 3 – Saint Mary of Egypt)

Having <u>been</u> a sinful <u>woman</u>, / thou becamest through repentance a <u>bride</u> of Christ. / Having attained angelic life, / thou didst defeat demons with the <u>weap</u>on of the Cross. // Therefore, O most glorious Mary, thou art a <u>bride</u> of the <u>King</u>dom.

Prokeimenon (Tone 1)

Let Thy mercy, O Lord, be upon us / as we have set our hope on Thee. *v*. Rejoice in the Lord, O ye righteous! Praise befits the upright!

Anoth<mark>er Prokeimenon (Tone</mark> 4 – Saint Mary of Egypt)

God is wonderful in His saints, / the God of Israel.

Epistle Reading: Hebrews 9:11-14

But Christ came as High Priest of the good things to come, with the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made with hands, that is, not of this creation. Not with the blood of goats and calves, but with His own blood He entered the Most Holy Place once for all, having obtained eternal redemption. For if the blood of bulls and goats and the ashes of a heifer, sprinkling the unclean, sanctifies for the purifying of the flesh, how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without spot to God, cleanse your conscience from dead works to serve the living God? Alleluia (3x's) (Tone 1)

v. God gives vengeance to me, and subdues people under me! Alleluia (3x's)

v. He magnifies the salvation of the King and deals mercifully with David, His anointed, and his seed forever. Alleluia (3x's)

v. I waited patiently for the Lord; He attended to me and heard my supplication. Alleluia (3x's) [TONE 1]

Gospel Reading: Mark 10:32-45

Now they were on the road, going up to Jerusalem, and Jesus was going before them; and they were amazed. And as they followed they were afraid. Then He took the twelve aside again and began to tell them the things that would happen to Him: Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be betrayed to the chief priests and to the scribes; and they will condemn Him to death and deliver Him to the Gentiles; and they will mock Him, and scourge Him, and spit on Him, and kill Him. And the third day He will rise again. Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Him, saying, "Teacher, we want You to do for us whatever we ask." And He said to them, "What do you want Me to do for you?" They said to Him, "Grant us that we may sit, one on Your right hand and the other on Your left, in Your glory." But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you ask. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?" They said to Him, "We are able." So Jesus said to them, "You will indeed drink the cup that I drink, and with the baptism I am baptized with you will be baptized; but to sit on My right hand and on My left is not Mine to give, but it is for those for whom it is prepared. And when the ten heard it, they began to be greatly displeased with James and John. But Jesus called them to Himself and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. Yet it shall not be so among you; but whoever desires to become great among you shall be your servant. And whoever of you desires to be first shall be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many.

All of creation rejoices in thee, O Full of Grace: / the assembly of Angels and the race of men. / O sanctified temple and spiritual paradise, / the glory of virgins, from whom God was incarnate and became a Child: / our God before the ages. / He made thy body into a throne, / and thy womb He made more spacious than the heavens. / All of creation rejoices in thee, O Full of Grace. // Glory to thee!

Communion Hymn:


The fourth Sunday (and fifth, when it occurs) the special collection will be earmarked towards Charity.

Fifth Sunday of Great Lent: Saint Mary of Egypt [April 10th]

On the fifth Sunday of Great Lent, the Church provides us with one final theme of prayer and repentance before we enter Holy Week, the life of Saint Mary of Egypt. Saint Mary explained to Abba Zosimas, "I was born in Egypt, and when I was 12 years old, I left my parents and went to Alexandria. There I gave myself to unrestrained sensuality. For more than 17 years I lived like that."

Saint Mary described how she boarded a ship of pilgrims on its way to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. Upon arrival she attempted to enter the church, but a force prevented her entrance. She realized that she had to repent of her sinful ways, and the Blessed Theotokos revealed to her that salvation awaited her in the desert beyond the Jordon River by means of continual prayer and fasting.

Abba Zosimas asked her, "How many years have passed since you began to live in the desert?" She replied, "It is 47 years." Abba Zosimas asked, "What food do you find here?" She said, "I had two and a half loaves of bread when I crossed the Jordan. Eating a little at a time, I finished them after a few years."

On this Sunday of Great Lent, the Church encourages us to emulate this powerful example of lifelong repentance by prayer and fasting. While we all surely eat more than two and a half loaves of bread in a few years, our meager fasting should heighten our compassion for the poor and the hungry, and whatever resources we are able to preserve by fasting become available for "the least of these my brethren." Let us reach out to the poor and destitute throughout the world with the inspiration of Saint Mary of Egypt, especially during this time of tumult and suffering.
