Texts for the Liturgical Service

Troparion (Tone 7 - Pentecostarion)

From the <u>sealed</u> tomb, Thou didst shine <u>forth</u>, O Life! / Through closed doors Thou didst come to Thy Disciples, O <u>Christ God.</u> / Renew in us through them an upright <u>spirit</u>, // by the greatness of Thy <u>mercy</u>, O Resur<u>rec</u>tion of all!

Troparion (Tone 4 – Saint George)

As a martyr of Christ, thou wast bound for good <u>deeds</u>, O George; / by faith thou <u>didst conquer</u> the torturer's <u>godlessness</u>. / Thou wast offered as a sacrifice <u>pleasing</u> to God, / thus receiving the crown of <u>vic</u>tory. // Through thine intercessions, forgiveness of sins is <u>grant</u>ed to all.

Kontakion (Tone 4 – Saint George)

God raised thee as His own gardener, O George, / for thou hast gathered for thyself the sheaves of <u>vir</u>tue. / Having sown in tears, thou dost now <u>reap with joy;</u> / thou hast shed thy blood in combat and won <u>Christ</u> as thy crown. // Through thine intercessions, forgiveness of <u>sins</u> is <u>granted</u> to all.

Kontakion (Tone 8 - Pentecostarion)

Thomas touched Thy life-giving side with an eager hand, O Christ God, / when Thou didst come to Thy Apostles through closed doors. // He cried out with all: "Thou art my Lord and my God!"

Prokeimenon (Tone 3)

Great is our Lord, and abundant in power! / His understanding is beyond measure! v. Praise the Lord! For it is good to sing praises to our God!

Another Prokeimenon (Tone 7 – Saint George)

The righteous shall rejoice in the Lord / and shall hope in Him.

Epistle Reading: Acts 5:12-20

And through the hands of the apostles many signs and wonders were done among the people. And they were all with one accord in Solomon's Porch. Yet none of the rest dared join them, but the people esteemed them highly. And believers were increasingly added to the Lord, multitudes of both men and women, so that they brought the sick out into the streets and laid them on beds and couches, that at least the shadow of Peter passing by might fall on some of them. Also a multitude gathered from the surrounding cities to Jerusalem, bringing sick people and those who were tormented by unclean spirits, and they were all healed. Then the high priest rose up, and all those who were with him (which is the sect of the Sadducees), and they were filled with indignation, and laid their hands on the apostles and put them in the common prison. But at night an angel of the Lord opened the prison doors and brought them out, and said, Go, stand in the temple and speak to the people all the words of this life.

Gospel Reading: John 20:19-31

Then, the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in the midst, and said to them, "Peace be with you." When He had said this, He showed them His hands and His side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. So Jesus said to them again, "Peace to you! As the Father has sent Me, I also send you." And when He had said this, He breathed on them, and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained. Now Thomas, called the Twin, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. The other disciples therefore said to him, "We have seen the Lord." So he said to them, "Unless I see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe." And after eight days His disciples were again inside, and Thomas with them. Jesus came, the doors being shut, and stood in the midst, and said, "Peace to you!" Then He said to Thomas, "Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing." And Thomas answered and said to Him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Thomas, because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." And truly Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name.

ANTIPASCHA: Saint Thomas Sunday [April 23nd]

Some icons depicting this event are inscribed "The Doubting Thomas." This is incorrect. In Greek, the inscription reads, "The Touching of Thomas." When St Thomas touched the Life-giving side of the Lord, he no longer had any doubts.

This day is also known as "Antipascha." This does not mean "opposed to Pascha," but "in place of Pascha." Beginning with this first Sunday after Pascha, the Church dedicates every Sunday of the year to the Lord's Resurrection. Sunday is called "Resurrection" in Russian, and "the Lord's Day" in Greek.

The Holy Martyr Empress Alexandra was the wife of Diocletian (284-305). Her supposed death was described in the Martyrdom of Saint George, which was written immediately after his death. The empress, however, received the crown of martyrdom several years later, in 314.

Many events occurred during these years. In 305 the emperor Diocletian resigned the throne and power passed to his co-ruler Maximian Galerius (305-311), a fanatic pagan, as well as a coarse and fierce soldier. His wife was Saint Valeria, the daughter of the holy Empress Alexandra, whom Diocletian had given in marriage against her will.

Saint Alexandra raised her daughter in Christian piety. When Galerius died, the emperor Maximinus sought her hand in marriage. When he was refused, he banished Saint Valeria to Syria, where she lived with her mother.

After the death of Maximinus in 311 the mother and daughter arrived in Nicomedia, trusting in the mercy of the emperor Licinius (311-324). Together with Saint Constantine, he had subscribed to the Edict of Milan, which gave Christians the freedom of religion, but secretly he remained an enemy of Christianity. Licinius gave orders to execute the holy Empress Alexandra and her daughter Valeria. They were beheaded, and their bodies thrown into the sea.

TODAY - Blessing of the Graves at Mount Moriah Cemetery after Divine Liturgy - (Weather Permitting)

A reminder for those who will go to the cemetery, whether it's just to bless graves or to also stay afterward for the Paschal picnic:

- * bring your favorite Pascha food and beverages, or anything people will enjoy;
- * bring chairs or lawnchairs if you wish to relax afterwards;
- * dress appropriately for that day's weather (jackets, hats, sunscreen, etc...); and
- * bring a change of comfortable clothing and most importantly, comfortable shoes or sneakers (it doesn't hurt)!
