## **Texts for the Liturgical Service**

#### **Troparion (Tone 1)**

When the <u>stone</u> had been sealed by the <u>Jews</u>, / while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure <u>body</u>, / Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, / granting <u>life</u> to the world. / The <u>powers</u> of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giver</u> of <u>Life</u>: / "Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ! / <u>Glo</u>ry to Thy <u>King</u>dom! // Glory to Thy dispensation, O thou who <u>lovest</u> of mankind!"

#### Troparion (Tone 2 - Sunday of Orthodoxy)

We <u>venerate Thy most pure image</u>, O <u>Good</u> One; / and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O <u>Christ</u> our God. / Of Thy good <u>will</u> Thou wast pleased to ascend the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh / and deliver Thy creatures from bondage to the <u>Enemy</u>. / Therefore with <u>thank</u>fulness we cry aloud to Thee: / "Thou hast filled all with joy, O our <u>Sav</u>ior, // for Thou alone hast come to save the world."

#### **Troparion (Tone 4 – Forefeast)**

Today is the prelude of joy for the <u>u</u>niverse! / Let us anticipate the feast and celebrate with exul<u>ta</u>tion: / Gabriel is on his way to announce the glad tidings to the <u>Virgin</u>; he is ready to cry out in fear and <u>won</u>der: // "Rejoice, O Full of Grace, the <u>Lord</u> is with thee!"

#### Kontakion (Tone 8 - Lenten Triodion)

No one could describe the <u>Word</u> of the <u>Fa</u>ther; / but when He took <u>flesh</u> from <u>thee</u>, O Theotokos, He accepted to be described, / and restored the <u>fal</u>len <u>image</u> to its former state by uniting it to divine <u>beauty</u> // We confess and proclaim our salvation in words and <u>images</u>.

#### Kontakion (Tone 8 – Forefeast)

Thou art the beginning of salvation for all of us on earth, Virgin Mother of God. / For the great Archangel Gabriel, God's minister, was sent from heaven to stand before thee to bring thee joy: // Therefore, we all cry to thee: "Rejoice, O unwedded Bride!"

#### Prokeimenon (Tone 4 - Song of the Fathers)

Blessed art Thou, O Lord God of our Fathers / and praised and glorified is Thy Name forever! v. For Thou art just in all that Thou hast done for us!

#### **Epistle Reading: Hebrews 11:24-26, 32-12:2**

By faith Moses, when he became of age, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt; for he looked to the reward. And what more shall I say? For the time would fail me to tell of Gideon and Barak and Samson and Jephthah, also of David and Samuel and the prophets: who through faith subdued kingdoms, worked righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became valiant in battle, turned to flight the armies of the aliens. Women received their dead raised to life again. Others were tortured, not accepting deliverance, that they might obtain a better resurrection. Still others had trial of mockings and scourgings, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented – of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, having obtained a good testimony through faith, did not receive the promise, God having provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect apart from us. Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. # First Sunday of Great Lent | Sunday of Orthodoxy [March 24<sup>th</sup>]

The first Sunday of Great Lent is called the Sunday of Orthodoxy because it commemorates the restoration of the Holy Icons and the triumph of the Orthodox Faith against the terrible heresy of the Iconoclasts, i.e. those heretics who refused to honor the Holy Icons. For more than a hundred years the Church was disturbed by the evil doctrine of iconoclasm.

The first Emperor to persecute the Church was Leo the Isaurian, and the last was Theophilos, the spouse of Saint Theodora (February 11), who reigned after her husband's death and re-established Orthodoxy in the time of Patriarch Methodios (June 14). Empress Theodora proclaimed publicly that we do not kiss the Icons as a sign of worship, nor do we honor them as "gods," but as images of their prototypes.

In the year 843, on the first Sunday of the Fast, Saint Theodora and her son, Emperor Michael, venerated the Holy Icons together with the clergy and the people. Since that time this event has been commemorated every year, because it was definitively determined that we do not worship the Icons, but we honor and glorify all the Saints who are depicted on them. We worship only the Triune God: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, and no one else, neither a Saint, nor an Angel.

Originally, the Holy Prophets Moses, Aaron, and Samuel were commemorated on this Sunday. The Alleluia verses appointed for today's Liturgy reflect this older usage.

#### First Saturday of Great Lent: The Miracle of the Boiled Wheat

Yesterday, we remembered the miracle of Saint Theodore and the boiled wheat. Fifty years after the death of Saint Theodore, the emperor Julian the Apostate (361-363), wanting to commit an outrage upon the Christians during the first week of Great Lent, commanded the city-commander of Constantinople to sprinkle all the food provisions in the marketplaces with the blood offered to idols. Saint Theodore appeared in a dream to Archbishop Eudoxius, ordering him to inform all the Christians that no one should buy anything at the marketplaces, but rather to eat cooked wheat with honey (kolyva).

In memory of this occurrence, the Orthodox Church annually celebrates the holy Great Martyr Theodore the Recruit on the first Saturday of Great Lent. On Friday evening, at the Divine Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts following the prayer at the ambo, the Canon to the holy Great Martyr Theodore, composed by Saint John of Damascus, is sung. After this, kolyva is blessed and distributed to the faithful. The celebration of the Great Martyr Theodore on the first Saturday of Great Lent was set by the Patriarch Nectarius of Constantinople (381-397).

The Troparion to Saint Theodore is quite similar to the Troparion for the Prophet Daniel and the Three Holy Youths (December 17, Sunday Before Nativity). The Kontakion to Saint Theodore, who suffered martyrdom by fire, reminds us that he also had faith as his breastplate (see I Thessalonians 5:8).

Saint Theodore the Recruit is also commemorated on February 17.
